The club is also involved in writing the T-book, coordinating Traditions Night, and organizing several homecoming events. The club's main task, however, will always be caring for and maintaining the Ramblin' Reck in order to ensure its identity as the primary symbol of Georgia Tech for all students, alumni, and fans. DEAN JIM DULL

James Edward Dull joined the Tech community in 1957 and was promoted to the Dean of Students in 1964. He remained at Tech until 1991 when he retired as Vice Present/Dean of Students Emeritus. During his tenure at Georgia Tech, Dean Dull oversaw virtually every aspect of student life. Students often cited Dean Dull's ability to connect with everyone, guided by his extraordinary powers of perception. In his memoirs, Dean Dull stated, "If there is any one thing for which I would like to be remembered at Georgia Tech, it is finding and establishing an official Ramblin' Reck of Georgia Tech." THE RAMBLIN' RECK

The Ramblin' Reck became the official mascot of Georgia Tech when Dean of Student Affairs Jim Dull recognized the need for an official and unifying symbol of the school's rich engineering tradition. Dean Dull searched the nation for such a symbol only to find a 1930 Ford Model A Sports Coupe parked outside his apartment in Towers Dormitory. After months of persuasion, he convinced the car's owner, Delta Airlines Captain Ted Johnson, to sell the car to the school for \$1000 - a profit which Johnson later donated back to Tech. On September 30, 1961, the Ramblin' Reck led the football team onto Grant Field for the first time, and it has not missed a home game since. The Ramblin' Reck - the official mascot of Georgia Tech - is now maintained with pride by the Ramblin' Reck Club.

THE NEED FOR AN ENDOWMENT

Being an 80-year old car, the Ramblin' Reck requires frequent maintenance and part replacement which costs upward of \$10,000 annually. However, the Institute itself does not provide any funds for the Reck, the Driver, or the Ramblin' Reck Club; therefore, the preservation and presentation of this unique icon is almost entirely supported through fees from non-official appearances. As a result, the Reck is frequently transported around Georgia for weddings, parties, and various other functions in an effort to raise the necessary funds. An endowment will allow the Reck to draw from a solid foundation for annual maintenance. In addition to necessary maintenance, the endowment will cover unforeseen costs that are difficult to budget or mitigate with savings. As the official mascot of Georgia Tech, it is assumed the Ramblin' Reck will represent the Institute at high profile events such as the 2004 Final Four in San Antonio, Texas or the 2010 Orange Bowl in Miami, Florida. Only through the giving of our dedicated alumni and friends can the club cover the added cost to transport the Reck to and from these events while ensuring the car's protection

on the road. The Class of 1984 has generously donated


burdens of displaying our unique icon. The endowment will ensure the presence of the Reck when celebrating future achievements of the Institute with alumni and fans.
